

Cardinals ready to soar even higher

BRIDGE CITY — After making nice headway in Coach Cody McGuire's first campaign, the Bridge City Cardinals are aiming to soar in 2022.

The Cardinals certainly improved leaps and bounds last year, going 4-6 and snagging a couple tight confidence-building district wins over Hardin-Jefferson and Hamshire-Fannett.

That is a far cry from what was a tough 1-7 season in 2020.

McGuire said coaches saw a lot of faces throughout the summer, adding participation was really good.

"Most of the kids have come in here and are looking pretty good," he said. "Now is when it really gets fun. We have a pretty good schedule set as far as practices go. The Cardinals are ready to go."

The Cardinals are installing a few new things this year on both sides of the ball.

"We've got Coach (Jason) Aubry in here as the new offensive coordinator and the kids really like his ideas, and they look forward to grasping them," said McGuire. "Defensively, a lot of it is going to be new. We've worked on some of this stuff during the summer during our allotted times, but now we can spend more time on what we want

to do."

The Cardinals are anxious to run a spread offense.

"It's going to be a lot of 10-Personnel and some 20-Personnel," said McGuire. "We're going to be throwing the ball around and running it, so it's going to be a balanced offense, for sure, and we'll see what happens."

Offensively, the Cardinals are looking at sophomore Hutch Bearden to step in and play well in replacing three-year starter Ethan Oceguera.

"Hutch looks really good, so we're excited to see what he can do. He attend the Manning Quarterback Camp over the summer and he can really sling it," said McGuire.

Also in the backfield at the backs include returning H-Back Noah Broussard, along with Caleb Breaux, Jerris Brown and Gavin Bodin.

McGuire is looking at a host of receivers to get the ball to and he likes his depth. Breaux, who has bounced back nicely from a knee injury last season, and sophomore Case McGuire have shown excellent hands and route-running in the summer.

"I really like our numbers, overall," said McGuire. "I'm really impressed with a lot of our sophomores that are going to help us in a lot of spots."

Matt Livingston, with all of his valuable experience, will look to anchor the offensive line.

The Cardinals are making the switch to a new 3-4 Defense in 2022. Senior line-backer Mason Pruitt is eager to lead the way after having a monstrous season last year by amassing 154 tackles.

"Mason is really stout and flies to the ball," said McGuire. "He's a good leader and all the kids really follow his lead well."

Nick Lejeune looks to again power to defensive front at his noseguard position.

The secondary is led by the likes of Breaux, Stephen Stone and Jagger Carlin.

McGuire is excited about what the Cardinals are putting on the field this year. They were close to a playoff berth before the injury bug got them last year at times.

"Last year was tough because we lost four starters to ACLs, and so vou've got to have guys behind the starters," said McGuire. "We were a few plays away from making the playoffs. We played Silsbee really well, and we had big wins over H-J and Liberty. Our kids fought the whole year. It's that 'next man up' mentality, so when somebody goes down, somebody's got to step up and make plays when they get the chance. I think

we're building much better depth then we had last year and that's a great sign."

The Cardinals are not shying away from tough opponents in non-district play. Even though Orangefield is no longer in the district, the Bayou Bowl will go on when the Cardinals open up the season at Orangefield Aug. 26.

They host Buna and LC-M before visiting Lumberton to close out non-district.

"We feel we have a formidable non-district schedule; it's not hard finding tough opponents around Southeast Texas," said McGuire.

The Cardinals are striving hard to compete in what many people consider the toughest district in the state, which includes state powers West Orange-Stark, Silsbee and Jasper. Bridge City will also have to tackle opponents in Hamshire-Fannett, Hardin-Jefferson, and Liberty again.

"There is no doubt, we're in one of the toughest 4A districts in the state," said McGuire. "The expectation is you want to be the best team every Friday. That's always going to be the goal. Our kids worked hard all summer and all off-season."

The Cardinals visit Hamshire-Fannett to crank up district play Sept. 23. They then have bye before hosting Jasper Oct. 7.

Cardinals feeling strong about upcoming season

BEAUMONT — The Lamar Cardinals' move back to the Southland Conference dominated the headlines during the offseason. With all of the attention back on the field, the Cards are looking to improve on last year's 1-9 record.

Head Coach Blane Morgan, who is entering his third season with Lamar, said the team made significant strides in the offseason. "Last fall we were a very physically immature team," he said.
"A lot of our guys were coming out of playing their senior year in high school. I think from a strength and speed standpoint, we will see how far we have come and how much closer we are to looking and feeling like a college team when we get out on the field."

Defensive lineman Jack McCarthy said the addition of strength coach Davis Conley has already produced results.

"You can tell there is a clear difference from where we were last year to now," McCarthy said. "I have gained 20 lbs. since last year alone. I think that it across the board. I think we have all shot up in strength and speed. Coach Conley has done a great job and has been a great addition to the program. I feel like we are putting it together a little bit.


Morgan said the move back to the

Southland was a positive financially and for quality of life.

"It feels like home." he said. "It feels like where we need to be. We were a founding member. If we really care about our athletes and their livelihood and welfare, certainly looking at the travel in the two conferences, the Southland makes more sense. I think it is more of a cost situation. We chartered planes for two trips last year, which is almost a six-figure cost for each trip. That certainly adds up. Prior to that, I don't know how many planes were boarded for away

games."

McCarthy said he is happy to regain the rivalry with McNeese with the move back to the Southland.

"I just want to win some games," he said. "We have had a tough couple of years. I am going to do whatever I can to help the team win. I am excited for the season. It just feels different in there. There is a different energy."

On the defensive side, Morgan will lean on guys like linebacker Tyler Jackson, lineman Jaymond Jackson and Ayden Bell.

"They played significant snaps last fall and are slated to be there again," Morgan said.
"On the back half, we have guys like Austin Goffney at safety. Demarco Roberts played a lot last year. The two corners from New Orleans will be good. We are looking for a lot from those guys."

Morgan feels really good about the offensive line.

"I like our leadership there," he said. "Jacob Bayer at center can be really good. B.J. Williams from Deridder and Jeremy Davis, we are excited about them. Moving Jalen Dummett out to receiver. We have a guy named Sevonne Rhea, who came to us from Texas State. We are excited about Khalan Griffin, who is a tailback from Rice

and we have Demashja Harris, who will be a surprising factor."

Dummett began last season as the team's starting quarterback before being moved out wide.

"I am taking the change day by day," Dummett said. "It has been fun. It is like learning to play football all over again. I have done both but this time, I am playing receiver full time. Now, I am just focusing on that and trying to make plays."

At 6⁵2" 210 lbs., Dummett brings quite a bit of size to the receiver group.

"I take a little bit of everything from receivers in college or pro," he said. "I think I will be good with yards after catch. I think I am a little harder to bring down. I think that will be a big thing for me."

Quarterback play is always important for college teams, and Morgan said the staff believes Mike Chandler played the best for the Cards last year.

"We have to develop depth," Morgan said. "We have to find a second quarterback and we have a good battle there, not that Mike is the starter yet."

The Cards start the season Sept. 1, when they travel to Abilene Christian. Lamar's first home game is Sept. 17 against Northern Colorado.

Conference play starts the following week against Northwestern State.

Bears second-year head coach Eric Peevey recognizes that and is making sure this year's players are not be resting on last year's laurels.

The Bears stormed to an 11-3 mark last season, advancing all the way to the Class

4A Region III Division I Finals. It was the Bears' furthest run in the postseason since 1997 and a far cry from their 1-8 2020 season.

"We're still running the same offense and the same defense pretty much," Peevey said. "We have some good athletes, and the kids really understand the X's and O's and we can coach them up to the best of our abilities as a staff, but it all boils down to playing with intensity and discipline and with their hearts."

The Bears return five

starters on each side of the ball.

"We really like what we have at quarterback and running back, our two defensive ends and what we have in the trenches overall on both sides of the ball," said Peevey. "Our biggest things that we need some of the younger kids to step in and do or at the receiver and defensive back spots. We lost a lot of those with the great senior class we had last year. We see some talent there. It's

just a matter of who unleashes it."

Leading the offensive surge should be senior running back Da'Marion Morris, who was a headache for opposing defenses throughout last season and a finalist for the Willie Ray Smith Offensive Award.

Morris cut up for 1,811 yards and 22 touchdowns rushing. He also hauled in 36 receptions for 434 yards and two TDs.

He proved his worth at defensive back, picking off six passes.

"Da'Marion is so versatile and performs so well, especially in big games," said Peevey.
"The experience he brings is unreal. His

ability to take it to the house on any given play, whether it's offense or defense, is something special to have on your team."

Dean Reynolds, who had a great year at tight end last season, moves over to quarterback to replace All-District performer Ashton Landry.

"Dean is a great leader and has always done what is asked of him," said Peevey. "He's really amped up to be back at quarterback. He has improved a ton with his speed and agility and he can hum the ball out there."

Offensive linemen Jan Nazario and Brady Wright look to anchor the offensive front, with sophomore Carson Phelps expected to step in and play well. Defensive end Amier Washington will certainly anchor the defense. The Willie Ray Smith Defensive Award Finalist, who verbally committed to Texas Tech, had 21 tackles for losses, including nine sacks a season ago.

Fellow defensive end Jarvis Riley is back to make his mark after being involved in 64 stops, including eight tackles for losses and four sacks.

"You talk about two excellent bookends, we've got them in Amier and Jarvis," said Peevey. "To see what they have been lifting during the summer has been phenomenal."

Luke McDow looks to step in and make strides at linebacker, along with William

Payne. Gianni Huffman will look to make an impact along the defensive front.

The Bears have an assortment of skill players that can play on both sides of the ball, including wide receiver/defensive back Darius Roberts, running back/defensive back Daunte Greer, wide receiver/defensive back Jacob Pollock and his brother, tight end/defensive lineman Jordan Pollock.

Many predictions across the state have the Bears battling Vidor and Lumberton for the district crown, but Huffman, Livingston and Splendora certainly can't be discounted.

LC-M shared the district title with Vidor last season but lost to the Pirates in district play. They squeezed out a tight victory against Lumberton.

"We have a tough old district for sure," said Peevey. "You can't discount anybody. Coach (Jeff) Mathews always has those Vidor Pirates ready. Lumberton is really strong and have some great athletes, which we saw last football season and this past track season. Huffman is always in the mix and have been near the top of the district year after year. Livingston always has tremendous athletes and had a great team a couple years ago and Splendora, they have big numbers and a lot of kids out. A lot of the games are going to come down to who plays the most mistake-free football. We did that well last year and we need to do that again. Play hard but play disciplined."

The Bears also have a

stiff non-district schedule to get them ready, including games with Hardin-Jefferson, West Orange-Stark, Bridge City, Houston Kincaid and Spring Legacy.

"It wouldn't be Orange County football if we don't play people like WO-S and Bridge City," said Peevey. "The Mustangs, everyone knows what they are about and they are loaded again with Coach (Hiawatha) Hickman leading the way now. Bridge City was much improved with Coach (Cody) McGuire last year and will be even better. Hardin-Jefferson has a new style of football with a new coach. We know Houston Kincaid is one of the best private schools in the state every year. Spring Legacy, that's a new one for us and we'll know more about them when the time comes."

Titans retool as district competition toughens

PORT ARTHUR — The Memorial Titans lost a lot of talent to graduation. The team lost the starting quarterback, who was a two-time district MVP, all of the leading skill players and several key playmakers on defense.

Despite the losses, the Titans have retooled and are hoping to earn the district title for the third consecutive season.

Head Coach Brian Morgan raved about how the team looked in the offseason but admitted it is a different game when pads come on.

"The summer has been good for us," he said. "There has been a lot of hard work. We haven't been able to tackle anybody.

"You don't know if you can really play football. You feel good about t-shirt and shorts football."

The Titans don't look completely different. Junior Daevon Iles returns for the Titans at safety to anchor a strong secondary with McNeese commit

Jelani Chevalier at corner. Caden Pitre led the district in sacks last year and returns to the Titans defensive line, and playmaking linebacker Darrell Thornton rounds out the front seven at linebacker.

"We graduated a good linebacker in Jayden Fisher and filling his spot has been kind of up in the air," Morgan said. "We have a couple of good candidates and we feel good there."

Chevalier said the team is looking good.

"We have had a lot of good players come in," he said. "I feel good about where we are at. We are a family. If you show you are good — even if you aren't good
— we are a family. We
take family seriously.
That is a big thing
here."

He looks for the secondary to lead the way for the Titans.

"The secondary is the best unit on the team," Chevalier said.

Chevalier stepped up as a leader and learned a lot from Jaylon Guilbeau, who is now with the Texas Longhorns.

During the past two seasons, the Titans were heavily reliant on the success of, now, former quarterback Jah'mar Sanders.

Morgan said Sanders was a constant, but added the rise in skill position players should ease the transition.


"He was really comfortable to sit in that chair and talk to. You knew he understood everything," Morgan said. "We have really talented kids. We possibly have more talent on the offense across the board, but a little less experience. You just knew how he was going to react in a game, and we don't know how these guys will react."

The Titans will lean on the leadership of left tackle Cayden Bowie, who verbally committed to the University of Houston. Bowie missed most of last season with a torn ACL, but has recovered well and is ready for 2022.


"I am very confident in our team," Bowie said. "We have been preparing since spring mentally and physically. I am just ready

to win games. I have been saying how much I miss football since I got injured. Now, I have to come back hard and be safe and smart."

Morgan said the receiving corps has played particularly well. Caleb Goodie, a senior transfer from Louisiana has played well during the spring and summer and is expected to be the top target for the Titans.

Jajiyah Green will be a big target for Memorial at 6'4". Junior Quinton Harper and Jaquan Holmes will be the speedsters of the group.

"We have really high thoughts of Goodie," Morgan said. "Holmes and Harper played a

little for us last year and are solid. The biggest growth was Green. Physical growth and mental growth."

Morgan said he is also excited to see a young one-two punch at the running back position. Sophomore Ja'Coryn Baker and freshman Amante Martin will take turns carrying the ball.

"The work ethic they have is unreal. They both just work so hard," Morgan said.

"I think they know neither of them are at the point to carry the load themselves.

"It lets us stay fresh, too. Baker is a kid that works, works, works. Amante has really had to push himself, because he has probably always been the best on the field for his age."

The Titans will rotate three sophomores along the defensive line.

"We think, in time, they are going to be special players," Morgan said. "It is just at what point. It could be early this year, late this year or next year, but they are going to be Power Five recruits."

Memorial added two teams to their district when Barbers Hill and Crosby moved up from Division II. The Titans played both teams last season, beating Barbers Hill and losing to Crosby in non-district play.

The Titans were named by Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine as a dark horse that could "bust some brackets come playoff time."

NEDERLAND — Last year's Nederland Bulldog team took home the Bum Phillips Bowl trophy with a 38-28 win over rival Port Neches-Groves. This year a young Nederland team hopes to keep the trophy in their paws and return to the playoffs after missing the postseason for the first time since 2016.

"We told them Day 1 that we are excited as

a coaching staff about this group," Head Coach Monte Barrow said. "We have worked with them over the summer and they like the game of football. As a coach, you like to show up with kids that want to be out here. They are not forced to be out here. We want to get the season started and get better every week and see where we can go."

with potentially six sophomores in starting spots.

be no cakewalks with

the likes of East Chambers, Anahuac, Buna, Hardin and Kirbyville.

"Number-wise, we hope it is beneficial to us," said Smalley. "That doesn't mean you are going automatically go out there and win every game. We found that out in 2018 when we dropped back down and didn't make the playoffs. I think the kids understand that. Also, it doesn't matter what 'A' you are in, you have to stay healthy, that's always a big key."

Running back Cameron Dischler and quarterback Brayden Parker are back to spearhead the offensive backfield. Dischler zipped for over 1,400 yards and 19 touchdowns last season.

"Dischler was a 'hoss' last year and we expect a lot out of him again, and he's the type of kid that would run through a brick wall and play anywhere we ask of him," said Smalley. "Brayden is the type of kid that lets nothing rattle him. He always has tremendous composure and loves to compete."

There will be plenty of talent to get the ball to in the backfield.

Gavin Perry-Koci is back at a tailback spot after having success last year. Also expected to see a slew of carries are Kyle Michael, Lane Gipson, Mason Manning, Case Singleton and Kane Smith. A lot of those guys will also see time catching the ball on the outside as receiver threats.

"We've got a really good group we can mix in and out of the backfield," said Smalley. "Perry-Koci, he showed he had 'wheels' last year and he's even faster now. As usual, we have a bunch of guys who are playing on both sides of the ball, so it's good to have some depth like we have."

The Bobcats' biggest concerns comes along the offensive line, in which every starter graduated.

Offensive line candidates include Gavin Pollock, Diego Garcia, Ethan Brown, Ethan Blackburn, Brayden McGee, Blake McRight, Kaleb Myers, Ruston Traxler and Leonardo Aguinaga.

Orangefield has two excellent big guys in senior tight ends and defensive ends Morgan Sampson and Koen Maddox to help lead the younger guys as they get their feet wet.

"Those two guys there are so important to what we want to be able to do on both sides of the ball," said Smalley.
"They definitely know what it is all about and our younger kids look up to them. We really want those two to step in and lead the way."
